## 6.0 CLIMATE CHANGE

An Urgent Cry for Ecological Justice: Reclaiming the Gospel Imperative for All Creation

We, bishops, women leaders and young leaders, united by a passion for climate justice, gathered during the Season of Creation 2018 at the Good Shepherd Retreat Centre in Hartebeespoort, South Africa. We came from 17 dioceses in 14 African countries and met under the auspices of the Anglican Communion Environmental Network. Our worship, reflection and discussion were guided by the theme 'Adaptation, Mitigation, and the Witness of the Church in an Era of Climate Change'.

We affirm and celebrate our heritage:

- Scripture, which beckons us to bear witness, with words and works, to the Good News of the redemption and restoration of all creation according to God's purpose and will - Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer.
- The sacramental tradition, which celebrates the gifts of creation for the nourishment of life and godliness, and embodies new creation in Christ.
- The liturgical tradition of Eucharist and devotion to prayer, which centre us on the death and resurrection of Christ and God's reconciling love for all humanity and all creation.
- The diversity of our cultures and contexts reflected in the global Anglican Communion.

We acknowledge and lament:

- our failure to live true to the Gospel imperative to steward creation for the glory of God and for the flourishing of humankind and creation
- our gravitation to the greed systems of the world that have resulted in gross inequalities and poverty, and continue to rape the earth, erode the dignity of humanity, and break genuine communion
- our sometimes turning the rich sacramental and Eucharistic tradition, and devotion to prayer, to mere ritual, thereby failing to serve the cause of justice for all humanity and creation
- our distortion of the Gospel by focusing narrowly on individual salvation rather than the redemption of all creation
- our failure to harness our diversity for a truly global witness to ecological justice, and

We are committed to:

*Theological education*

- holding eco-theology trainings at all levels (clergy, laity, guilds, youth)
- popularising available ecological resources
- including ecology in theological education curricula
- including ecology in liturgies
- organising refresher courses/conferences in ecology

- making budget provision for ecological activities in our Dioceses and encouraging such provision in our Provinces.

#### *Youth:*

- initiating and increasing environmental consciousness and awareness among children and youth
- empowering children and youth to initiate or take part in tree planting and re-planting programmes and to desist from contributing to pollution
- enhancing the capacity of school teachers, confirmation teachers, youth workers and children in ecological matters
- creating an African Youth Eco-Movement
- encouraging budget provision for youth engagement in ecological justice.

#### *Sustainability:*

- planting indigenous and environmentally friendly species and removing alien vegetation which degrades the environment
- exploring ways to restore degraded land and enable natural regeneration
- using church land productively, for example, for solar energy, and increasing green cover and bio-diversity
- establishing waste management projects, including collection and productive use of waste
- promoting organic, climate smart, agriculture

- engaging proactively with urban planning systems with a view to addressing degraded human habitation, and advocating for the provision of clean water, sanitation and accessibility
- ensuring that our church buildings and property provide an eco-model for the community
- stop using single-use plastics on our church properties.

*Partnerships:*

- promoting the establishment of environmental desks in every diocese
- encouraging the inclusion of environmental issues on diocesan websites, sharing challenges and successes
- initiating resource mobilisation strategies to promote ecological justice
- promoting active networking on environmental issues through twinning with other dioceses and Provinces, and encouraging exchange programmes in order to learn from one another.

Our urgent cry is to the Anglican Communion:

- our Dioceses, Provinces, CAPA, and Lambeth 2020, that Good News for creation and ecological justice be placed at the top of the agenda. All of us are invested in this and all are part of the problem, whether in the north, south, east or west. Our Communion provides opportunity for global witness and resources to tackle this global challenge together.

The purpose of the meeting was to share and analyse what we had learned from others as well as our members. It aimed at, identifying and prioritise to feed into the framework and understand our role.

53 participants came together to share their MULO experiences and decide the way forward. In this workshop participants were challenged to look beyond the immediate changes to the lasting difference that M.U makes in the

lives of others. Although there was variation for the priority groups for each country and cluster, there was great similarity in these long term changes that they bring. The most frequently recurring were around a sense of belonging, reduced stigma and inclusion within the community – in reference to those living with H.I.V, the albinism community ex-prisoners and others. We endeavour self-reliance, economic stability, mindset change to take responsibility for their own future and increased faith.

We wish to adopt this concept to the fullest so that the church becomes relevant to the communities in which we operate.

## **13.0 SCHOOLS INFRASTRUCTURAL DEVELOPMENT**

As we approach the close of the year, common sense should direct us to look back and ask ourselves how far we have gone during the course of the year under review. What were our achievements and where did we not perform to our satisfaction in infrastructure provision and development. We could have encountered some dilemmas what could be the best way to rid the school of such impediments to teaching and learning.

This therefore calls for our stakeholders to engage in putting in place the roadmap for the development projects and rise to conducive learning and teaching environments. It is time to come up with budgets so that prioritised projects can be backed off timeous and adequate funding. However we should not rule out the provision of labour and other materials such as bricks, river sand, pit sand and others being provided by the parents and other well-wishers. The school authorities should first and foremost seek and secure the cooperation of

the parents. Parents' involvement in the provision of schools infrastructure provision is crucial. Unless they are made to feel that the school is theirs, they will not be able to tackle the school project with zeal and interest. Good communication should prevail between the parents and the school. We already appreciate that in some schools take an active role in school development.

For the recently acquired schools let us remember that there is the Responsible Authority. For all our developmental and spiritual activities, schools, should liaise with the Responsible Authority, through the Church Education Secretary so that collaborative efforts are made.

As alluded to in the last circular, the Responsible Authority is in the process of organising a meeting for our Heads SDC Chairpersons and the clergy who are actively involved in the running of schools in their respective Archdeaconries. You will be informed of the date and venue as soon as the Responsible Authority gives the nod. Be rest assured the date should be before the end of October 2018.

## 16.0 THE CHURCH'S ROLE IN STOPPING THE SPREAD OF .....TYPHOID AND CHOLERA

The Church exists in a community and thus it cannot stand aloof to the challenges bedeviling the society. We are therefore called to be active participants in the amelioration and eradication of the effects of Cholera and Typhoid by adhering to a contextual theology which addresses this era. I want to encourage our congregations and schools to spread these warnings about Cholera and Typhoid throughout their communities and carefully follow all precautionary ways to avoid it. Whilst, Gweru, and Harare have been the epicenters of the epidemics, cases have been reported in other parts of our country.

### STEPS WE SHOULD TAKE TO MITIGATE THE RISKS OF CHOLERA AND TYPHOID IN OUR CONGREGATIONS AND SCHOOLS

- i. We should avoid unnecessary travel.
- ii. We have suspended visits by parents to our schools.
- iii. Schools and Churches should be on very high alert and must activate good hygienic standards at all times.

- iv. Priests and school heads should address parishioners, students and staff on this serious matter and make use of health personnel nearest to them for expert information.
- v. Parishes and schools should form Cholera and Typhoid awareness and Hygiene groups to raise the awareness.
- vi. Church and School premises should be litter free, clean and sewerage or waste disposal supervised carefully and regularly.
- vii. Church and School Administration must take all measures necessary to avert any kind of contamination as the results could be catastrophic.

THOSE WHO DECIDE TO HAVE GATHERINGS, PLEASE TAKE NOTE OF THE FOLLOWING;

- viii. Avoid unnecessary gatherings.
  - ix. Let us avoid the tradition of shaking hands in the meantime until the scare is over.
  - x. Gatherings must be supervised by Health Personnel.
  - xi. Clean the environment.
  - xii. Wash vegetables and fruits under running water.
  - xiii. Eat food whilst still hot – avoid cold foods.
  - xiv. Wash your hands with soap under running water.
  - xv. All places of worship must be clean, have functional toilets and clean running water.
  - xvi. Any case of diarrhea and or vomiting must be referred to the nearest healthcare centre immediately.
- Our country is in short supply of medicines and other essentials.

I urge you all to support national fundraising initiatives by the Ministry of Finance in collaboration with the Ministry of Health.

Cholera and Typhoid is a result of our poor stewardship of the God given environment. Poorly managed environments are characterized by burst sewer pipes and sewerage flowing all over human habitants, poor waste management by communities and local authorities/ municipalities. Residents must revisit what they term garbage and therefore practice good waste management techniques and most importantly recycle. As Churches we must complement this with local clean up campaigns and remove heaps of garbage in our areas rather than wait for the local authorities to do so-where such authorities are not delivering. May the Almighty God richly bless us as we endeavour to create a Cholera and Typhoid free nation. Shalom.
